The Word of God

Reflection (by Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York)

R.S. Thomas in his poem 'Pilgrimages' says this: 'He is such a fast God, always...leaving as we arrive.' It is an astonishing insight. As soon as we gain some understanding of who God is, God moves on ahead of us, confounding our conclusions, refusing to be pinned down.

'Do not cling to me' is what Jesus said to Mary Magdalene on the first Easter day. Do not think that human understanding can contain or constrain the mystery of God's presence. Therefore, as soon as Peter comes to his own astonishing conclusion that Jesus is not just a prophet, not just a great man, he is thrown backwards: this Messiah must suffer and die, and those who follow him must carry the same cross.

In one breath Peter is named as the rock upon which this house will be built; in the other he is revealed as the sand, the stumbling block, even Satan himself, upon which it will crumble. Well might we conclude that there is no profit in gaining this wealth of knowledge if it means losing our soul.

So we inch a bit further forward; we ask ourselves again: who can this Christ be? And as we are led into fresh revelations of God's presence, so we are also confronted by our own weakness and need. Like Peter, we are both rock and sand.

Prayers of intercession

Let us pray to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We give thanks for the Church, and for all who have taken up their crosses and followed you as disciples down the years. May we too be ready to take up our cross and follow you, trusting in you always. Give us courage and boldness, humility and grace, and make us agents of your self-giving love, reflecting your likeness into the world you made.

First reading - Romans 9.1-5

¹I am speaking the truth in Christ—I am not lying; my conscience confirms it by the Holy Spirit— ²I have great sorrow and unceasing anguish in my heart. ³ For I could wish that I myself were accursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my own people, my kindred according to the flesh. ⁴ They are Israelites, and to them belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the worship, and the promises; ⁵ to them belong the patriarchs, and from them, according to the flesh, comes the Messiah, who is over all, God blessed forever. Amen.

Second reading - Matthew 14.13-21

13 Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. 14 When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. 15 When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." 16 lesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." 17 They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." 18 And he said, "Bring them here to me." 19 Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. 20 And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. 21 And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Reflection (by Steven Croft, Bishop of Oxford)

The crowds seem bigger, the ministry more public, the miracles even greater. The feeding of the 5,000 recalls the ministry of Moses and manna in the wilderness. Next Sunday's description of Jesus walking on water recalls the great nature miracles of the Old Testament.

How does Jesus respond to this larger, more public canvas? It is no accident that as the crowds grow, Matthew tells us deliberately that Jesus takes time to be by himself. In the opening verse, the withdrawal is in response to the news of the death of John the Baptist. We might speculate that Jesus is taking time to grieve and to take stock about what John's death means for his own ministry. After the feeding of the 5,000, we are specifically told that Jesus dismisses the crowds and goes up the mountain by himself to pray.

This lesson is a valuable one. The more public the ministry, the more this needs to be balanced by times of withdrawal and solitude. The

The Collect

God of glory, the end of our searching, help us to lay aside all that prevents us from seeking your kingdom, and to give all that we have to gain the pearl beyond all price, through our Saviour Jesus Christ. maybe Jeremiah or Elijah (v.14)? Or perhaps John the Baptist had escaped Herod's prison despite all the rumours. If your own history and geography is the limit of your thinking, those were not unreasonable speculations.

However, Peter (or as he was known at the time, Simon) had spent a great deal of time in the company of Jesus. Like anyone who devotes themselves to Jesus over a sustained period, he was beginning to see things from God's point of view. To recognize Jesus as the Messiah was an extraordinary thing. To confess him as the Son of the Living God was beyond extraordinary (v.16).

It was a transformative moment for Peter. Like Abraham before him, he received a new name. Like Abraham he became known as 'the rock' (Isaiah 51.1-2). And like Abraham his act of faith enabled a new starting point in God's plan of salvation for all humankind.

'Look, I have set before you an open door, which no one is able to shut,' declared Jesus in a vision some decades later (Rev. 3.8). It was open because the keys were in safe hands (v.19). It's still open. Come in out of the cold.

Prayers of intercession

Let us pray to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We give thanks for your Church throughout the world. May we stand firm on the rock of faith, testifying always to the truth of who you are. more on display we are, the more we need to tend to our private world. This in in part about paying attention to our emotions, our inner self. It is in part about paying attention to God's direction and call and values in the midst of tumultuous events around us and within us.

Prayers of intercession

Let us pray to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The Collect

Lord God, your Son left the riches of heaven and became poor for our sake:

when we prosper save us from pride,

when we are needy save us from despair, that we may trust I you alone; through Jesus Christ our Lord. discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect.

³ For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. ⁴ For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, ⁵ so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. ⁶ We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ⁷ ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; ⁸ the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.

Second reading - Matthew 16.13-20

13 Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" 14 And they said, "Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." 15 He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" 16 Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." 17 And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. 18 And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. 19 I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." 20 Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

Reflection (by Peter Graystone, Church Army)

Practically everyone who came into contact with Jesus realized that there was something special about him. Who was he? Could he be a reincarnation of someone from the Jews' golden age of prophecy –

Psalm 85.8-13

- 8 Let me hear what God the LORD will speak, for he will speak peace to his people, to his faithful, to those who turn to him in their hearts.

First reading - Romans 10.5-15

- ⁵ Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that "the person who does these things will live by them." ⁶ But the righteousness that comes from faith says, "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?" (that is, to bring Christ down) ⁷ "or 'Who will descend into the abyss?" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). ⁸ But what does it say?
- "The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart"

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); 9 because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. 10 For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. 11 The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put

to shame." 12 For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. 13 For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Second reading - Matthew 14.22-33

22 Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. 23 And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, 24 but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. 25 And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. 26 But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. 27 But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

²⁸ Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." ²⁹ He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. ³⁰ But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" ³¹ Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" ³² When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. ³³ And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

Reflection (by Bishop John Pritchard)

Being around Jesus was never boring. (Why do many people today think it must be?) After a hard day's teaching and feeding 5,000 people

The Collect

Lord of heaven and earth, as Jesus taught his disciples to be persistent in prayer, give us patience and courage never to lose hope, but always to bring our prayers before you; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." 23 But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." 24 He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." 25 But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." 26 He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." 27 She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." 28 Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

Reflection (by Steven Croft, Bishop of Oxford)

Another attempt to withdraw from the crowds and an encounter that disturbs us. Our sympathies are all with the woman, of course. She is a foreigner and a gentile. Her daughter is tormented and in her need she sees Jesus as the only grounds for hope, and so she shouts and keeps shouting and kneels and begs for mercy. We are impatient with the disciples who want to protect Jesus' retreat and their own privacy. We recoil even from the words of Jesus who seems to insult the woman and all her race.

The term 'dogs' (v.26) is softened a little, to be sure, when we know that the original refers to household pets – and young ones at that. 'Puppies' might be a better translation. There are strands of affection and respect in Jesus' first response. In the woman's reply there is boldness and wit as well as respect and faith.

The passage echoes in Jesus' life the stories of Elijah and Elisha, both of whom raise up the children of widows (1 Kings 17 and 2 Kings 4). In Elijah's case, the widow was also in the territory of Sidon. Both of the healing stories in Kings are elaborate and difficult. Jesus heals instantly, with just a word. Something greater than the greatest of the prophets is here.

on the everlasting bits and pieces of a picnic, he now walks across the nearby lake (finding Peter a willing but unreliable student) to Gennesaret, where a crowd of people touch his cloak and get healed.

In today's verses from chapter 14, we're faced with the second of two miracles of nature that will always divide Christian opinion. Fortunately, eternal salvation doesn't depend on it. Perhaps we might just claim the insight of Austin Farrer that, if Jesus did indeed walk on water, it wasn't because of an arbitrary power over nature, but because love demanded it.

We don't know what the limits of Almighty love really are. However, we can also see Matthew demonstrating that Jesus embodies divine creativity because he has creative mastery over nature, in the form of the wild, chaotic lake.

As we watch Jesus, we learn more about him and more about ourselves. Do we resist this portrait of Jesus or do we embrace it? Are we embarrassed by it or encouraged by it? How comfortable are we with this Jesus? Above all, is there any chance that we would get out of our boat and walk towards Jesus? Because, metaphorically at least, that's what we're called to do every day.

Prayers of intercession

Let us pray to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We pray for your Church. When we are in danger of being overwhelmed, increase our faith. When we are in trouble, help us to hear your voice saying, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.' Give us a new vision of where you are calling us, and go with us as we witness to you and proclaim your saving love.

We pray for your world, grappling with so many problems, and at this time the challenge of a global pandemic. We pray for all who are swamped by the difficulties they face, and who are being battered by

the storms of life; for those sinking beneath burdens too hard to bear. Reach out your hand to them, we pray.

We give thanks for all who have supported us in times of trouble and distress. We pray in particular for all key workers, in the health service and in other areas of public service, who have risked their own welfare in caring for others. Strengthen, protect and uphold them, we pray.

We pray for our friends, our families and all whom we love. We pray too for those who have no one to pray for them. We lift before you now those for whom we have a particular concern...

We remember before you those who have passed beyond the storms of this life and reached the haven of rest. Though our faith be weak, we cry out to you, almighty God. Grant that we may come to be with your saints in life eternal.

The Collect
